Upon retirement, the Sheila Barber Citizenship award was created in her honor. Each year, it is awarded to one student in each class who exhibits empathy, support, compassion and understanding.

During her retirement years, Sheila kept herself very busy walking everywhere, bowling, swimming, and gardening. Spending time with her 4 grandchildren, Taylor (David), Parker, Arielle and Emmah (Will) was the highlight of her life. She was actively involved in all of their lives and took great pleasure in helping to raise them, watching their concerts and sports, and being part of their graduations.

When visiting Sheila, you would notice that the grass was always freshly cut, the driveway was recently painted, and the smell of fresh baked shortbread was in air! In the later years

of Sheila's retirement, she took great pride in her very active lifestyle and her willingness to participate in anything and everything.

Sheila was immensely proud of her family and she leaves behind nothing but beautiful memories.
