It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of Frederick Brian Simmonds, on Saturday January 12, 2019, at Tansley Woods Long Term Care Facility in Burlington, Ontario, with his loving wife, Esme, by his side.

Brian was born in Littlehampton, West Sussex, England on October 11, 1936 to Frederick and Rosanne Simmonds. He was the eldest of four children. Brian will be deeply missed by Esme, his beloved wife of 54 years, his daughters, Michelle (Michael) and Shauna (Antonio), and his grandchildren, Samantha, Meghan and Liam. He will also be missed by his brother, Christopher, his sister, Margaret and his many nieces and nephews in England, as well as his sister-in-law, Rita. He is now reunited in Heaven with his sister Eileen.

Brian left home for the Isle of Wight when he was 16 years old to begin an engineering apprenticeship. He started his career at the Saunders-Roe Limited, on the Isle of Wight. Brian was an avid rower, winning many trophies at local regattas around Southern England.

Brian, his wife and eldest daughter came to Canada in 1969. Brian enjoyed a fulfilling and successful career in the aerospace industry.

Brian and Esme were inseparable – they loved spending time together on long drives, weekend projects, and traveling around the world. Their trip to New Zealand was their most memorable.

In his spare time, Brian could be found outdoors, enjoying the sun, tending to his garden, or socializing with family and friends. Brian was also an avid reader and spent many hours with his head buried in a book, listening to jazz. He had a particular affinity for history books, crime novels, and studying British maps.

When Brian retired in 2003, his passion for aircraft inspired him to volunteer at the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum in Hamilton. He also spent time volunteering with the St. Vincent de Paul Society, helping others less fortunate.

He will be remembered for his kindness, sense of humour, funny stories, and his love of music.

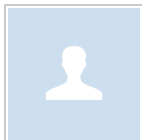

He then informed me that he could not walk as he knees had seized up. I was fully trained in First Aid so I immediately ordered him a double Glenmorganie Whisky and he was like a “ferret up a drainpipe”. (As they say in Good Old Blighty.)

There are many stories to tell about our visits to Canada, but the visit there for Michele’s wedding when we all came Dad included, come to mind. It is a “Dry Old Do”, was mentioned many, many time by him. The boat going backwards after Brian had fixed the outboard motor cable will be remembered forever!

And we still have the video of it!

I am very sorry that I will not be there for the funeral. I may not be there in person but I will be in Spirit.

I visited Brian a year or so ago before his decline and they are the memories I will always have of my dear loving brother.

I will miss you very much, but I promise you that I will endeavor to carry on your legacy to your daughters and grandchildren to understand our strange, dark, and wonderful British sense of humour that you never lost.
